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Executive Summary

District Strategic Plan 2025

Orange County Public Schools is the eighth-largest school district in the United States and the fourth largest in Florida. The district serves more than 206,000 students at 202 schools and is one of the largest employers in Central Florida with more than 25,000 team members.

Vision: To ensure every student has a promising and successful future.

Mission: With the support of families and the community, we create enriching and diverse pathways to lead our students to success.

School Collection Development Plan

East Lake ES serves 477 students enrolled in grades Kindergarten through fifth. The student population's ethnicity is made up of 45% Hispanic and 55% Non-Hispanic students. Additionally, we serve a diverse population made up of 78% White, 12% Black, 0% Native, 4% Asian, 1% Pacific, and 6% Multicultural students.

The administration includes Principal Elizabeth Bounds and Assistant Principal Joshua Torres. East Lake ES is proud to offer the many special programs which provide students with opportunities. These include Afterschool Acceleration Tutoring, Chorus, Art Club, News Crew, Chess Club, Library Makerspace, Lego Robotics, Sunshine State Young Readers Awards, K-Kids Club, and Read to Succeed.

A thorough analysis of the current media center collection at East Lake ES indicates that the average age of the collection is 2008 and the number of books per student is 20. The <u>American Association for School Libraries</u> has established a criteria for highly effective media centers that includes a ratio of 15-20 books available per student in the collection. At this time, East Lake ES does meet the recommended standards for the number of books per student.

The analysis of the collection also revealed the following areas of strengths and concerns:

- Based on the reading scores, students need support in early literacy reading and would benefit from additional books in our collection.
- Students in the intermediate grades need literacy support to improve on their standardized reading skills.
- In addition to the physical media center collection, the district provides almost 5,000 eBooks, audiobooks, and digital magazines.
- The average publication date changed from 2006 to 2008 because 4,168 outdated titles were weeded. This is acceptable but needs to be improved.
- This collection contains 60% Fiction and 40% Nonfiction and shows a need for an increase in current nonfiction titles.
- Purchases of new books will focus on Hispanic titles to reflect our population.

Comparison between 2021-22 and 2022-23 Testing Data

(adapted from https://www.fldoe.org/accountability/assessments/k-12-student-assessment/results/2023.stml) In 2023, the state transitioned from Florida Standards Assessments (FSA) to Florida Assessment of Student Thinking (FAST) for English Language Arts (ELA) and Mathematics. The 2022-23 for FAST and Benchmarks for Excellent Student Thinking (B.E.S.T.) End-of-Course (EOC) assessments are based on **provisional** achievement level cuts that are linked to each assessment's respective 2021-22 reporting scale. Comparisons should not be made between the 2023 data and previous years' data. The implementation of FAST K-2 in the 2022-23 school year was the first administration of statewide assessments for students in grades K-2. These assessments include Star Early Literacy Proficiency, Star Reading Proficiency, and Star Math Proficiency.

Collection Analysis

The collection is developed for and influenced by students, their interests, academic needs and alignment to the curriculum. The data below is a snapshot of the collection based on a Titlewise Analysis from July 2023. Purchasing or weeding after that time is not reflected in this data.

To deepen focus on strategic collection development, specific sections of the collection were analyzed in detail to determine whether the media center collection reflects and represents various points of view and experiences. The goal is to provide a balanced collection that can be both a mirror, to reflect a reader's experience, and a window, so readers can experience different viewpoints.

Results

Based on the available school data of East Lake ES in comparison to Collection Analysis results, it was found that:

After completing a deeper, targeted analysis of the representation section of the TitleWise report, it was determined that:

- Hispanic students are 45% of the school's population. However we only have 115 titles, which is only 1.2% of our total collection available.
- African American students represent 12% of our population. We currently have 298 titles in circulation, which is only 3% of our total available titles.
- Asian students represent 4% of our total population and our current collection has 1.9% titles that represent this culture.
